Relaxed Entry - Starting Tuesday, September 5th students will no longer be required to line up when entering the school in the morning. September's Character Focus is on Friendliness and Citizenship - Friendliness simply means being a friend. It is taking an interest in other people and going out of your way to make them feel welcome. Friendliness helps people feel they belong. Friendships do not just happen they are made by people who are willing to work at making them successful. They are similar to planting a garden, it starts by planting a seed. Teaching our children the importance of being kind, respectful and caring will assist them in showing friendliness to their peers. We need to teach our children to like themselves and believe that they have something to share with others. Just wearing a smile on their faces is the first step to showing friendliness!

Citizenship means being a good helpful member in society. This can be extended to school, class, community and family. We can teach our children to be good citizens by using their manners, sharing with others and showing care and concern for others. Citizenship can also be shown by working together, cooperating, encouraging others and treating each other with respect. By trying our best to be good citizens we are teaching our children that they can contribute to making their school, class, community, and family a terrific place to be!

<u>**vOur Friendship Benchv**</u> - The Friendship Bench is a designated place where any student who has nobody to play with or who wants to be invited to join a game can go and sit. When students see a child on the bench they will know that person feels lonely and will invite them to play. Once the Friendly Helpers (grade 4 peer support) have been trained they will monitor the bench daily and organize games the students would be interested in playing. It is our hope that all children in our school will be included and have fun playing with their peers at recess. If you have any questions or ideas let Mrs. Zadorozny know.

Child Development Advisor (CDA) - I would like to introduce myself to those of you who do not know me and inform you of my unique position at Elbow Valley. My name is Nancy Zadorozny and I am the school's Child Development Advisor (C.D.A.). My training and experience have equipped me to act in a capacity similar to that of a counsellor with our students. I offer a wide spectrum of services to the students, teachers, and you the parents. Below is a brief list of some of the services I offer:

I develop and implement programs relating to the social/emotional growth of students.

- I provide proactive and preventative programs as well as intervention with issues which have already been identified.
- I conduct individual and group sessions in the areas of classroom survival skills, self-esteem, friendship, anger management, social skills, getting along, social skills, bullying, divorce and grief, relaxation and stress management. I also provide preventative programming in individual classes.
- I conduct a year-long social skills program in all grade one classes.
- I conduct a year- long self-esteem program, Free the Horses, in all grade two classes.
- I assist students in resolving conflicts and teach them how to handle these situations.
- I work with teachers to help assess student's strengths and weaknesses in social skills.
- I have Teddy Bear Grams in each classroom which are used when a student has a problem or is experiencing a conflict with a peer and needs to talk to someone.
- I provide support to teachers in the classroom.
- I provide information for parents on numerous topics. If you require information I do not have I will try to get it for you.
- I provide support and resources to parents and families.
- I am in charge of the Friendly Helpers and conduct a 6 week training program. The Friendly Helpers assist peers in conflict resolution as well as plan recess activities for our students.
- I arrange theme days to help promote a positive school environment.
- I arrange school wide Fun activities to increase school climate
- I am in charge of Club Moo, a school wide milk incentive program


Kelso's Choices - Conflict and disagreement is normal and often happens when children are together. Our goal is to teach our students several positive ways to deal with these difficult situations and provide them skills that will last a lifetime.

Kelso's Choices - is a conflict management skills program that we will continue to teach our students this year. The



program is based on the premise that every child is capable of becoming a peacemaker and of solving conflicts peacefully. Kelso the frog teaches students how to solve "small" problems on their own. "Small" problems include conflicts that cause "small" feelings of annoyance, embarrassment, boredom, etc. "BIG problems" always need to be taken to an adult. These are situations that are scary, dangerous, illegal, etc. Students will learn that if they have a small problem they need to try 2 of Kelso's choices. Below is Kelso's wheel illustrating their choices. If they have a big problem they need to go and tell an adult they trust. I will be introducing these skills to our K-2 students in

their classes during my scheduled times. For the grade 3 and 4 students I will do a workshop on the choice wheel. In addition, the Friendly Helpers will be trained in the choices and how to help their peers solve their conflicts peacefully.



By using Kelso's choices, we believe that our students will develop effective problem-solving skills that they can use again and again. It will assist them in dealing with conflicts in a positive manner and teach them that they do have choices. We encourage you to become familiar with this program and use it in your home. By working together, we can develop a positive healthy life skill for our children to use at home and school.

Bus Ride-Along - Just a reminder that if your child is having a friend ride along on their bus, the bus company <u>MUST</u> be contacted. Following is the procedure we would like to see followed to ensure all parties are aware of the ride along and to make things easier for the bus drivers and supervisors: E-mail Southland ridealong@southland.ca

- 2. Contact your bus driver and let them know you have e-mailed the bus company
- 3. Write a note in the child's agenda for the bus supervisor or print out email confirmation. This is extremely beneficial in case the bus driver does not receive word of the ride along. Only if there is a note in the agenda can the bus supervisor approve the ride-along.
