A. Welcome

Tina Andiel Carlson / Naomi Shumka

Tina Andiel Carlson welcomed everyone.

D. School Trustee Report

Judi Hunter

The budget continues to be an area of concern. The provincial government has said that schools are receiving 20% more budget than what they need. Given the expected special needs enrolment growth and what is expected to be required for PUF (program unit funding for occupational therapy) and refugee funding, we will need to find ways to manage with less. Every parent will receive a survey from the Board asking them what is most important to them. Judi also advised that everyone is being challenged to thin outside the norms around how funds can be generated. Collectively, we need to think differently about infrastructure as well and using our facilities more broadly across our communities.

One of the websites Judi frequents is greatschools.org. She loves the range of articles that are sent.

Recently she looked at an article called Decision Fatigue. The article caught her eye because she has suffered from it. Sometimes, we have had to make so many decisions in a short period of time, our brains literally shut down. This happens to children as well. Sometimes we ask them to make so many little decisions that they are exhausted by the time they need to make a decision that counts.

Social psychologist Roy F. Bameister says that by establishing routines with our children such as porridge for breakfast, bed at 8pm, homework 4-5, brush your teeth before bed, you save your child the decision-making for important matters such as how to finish my social assignment due

tomorrow. Mr. Bameister also suggest that when kids are tired of decision making it is important to feed their brains – preferably a high-protein snack.

Recently, Judi read the book "Boys – what it means to become a man" by Rachel Giese. It is classified a globe 100 book of the year. She found the book to be all over the map with issues. However, she did find some nuggets.

"The thinking is that inclusion decreases stigma and isolation, and helps non-disabled students learn to be more tolerant. Yet in practice, integration often happens without proper resources or teacher training, and with zero education for classmates about disabilities." P 90. She then goes on to describe some of the behaviors she has witnessed and is frustrated by the school's response. I believe she is correct on this front, in that many of our high needs' students are best served in settings that address their learning needs.

She did speak to the need for cultural role models in our schools and on that count, she is right on.

She also speaks positively about the use of technology saying that it provides boys with a venue to express their visibility though media She cites a young Jay Versace, a black, queer boy from New York who began making Vine videos when he was 16. He developed over 3 million followers on social media.

She speaks positively about the WISEGUYZ program operated by the Sexual health Centre in Calgary. It is running at Springbank Hgh School and has received positive feedback. It teaches young men about sexuality, respect for women and social responsibility.

E. Council Reports

1. Principal's Report

Brendan reported that the school has found a way to absorb the budget cutbacks for this school year without a significant impact. Alberta Education funds are used to cover the basics such as teacher's salaries, paper, facility costs, etc. School generated funds from milk sales, shirts, lunches can be used for the extras. Brendan proposed that \$10K of funds generated from the milk sales be used to enhance some of the spaces in the school. This was approved by school council unanimously.

There was a general discussion around the student led conferences and how they went in February. The general consensus is that they were better this year with some 1:1 time with the teachers to discuss your child. Parents generally want a little more 1:1 time with the teacher. It was also suggested that childcare be provided for younger children to ensure parents can have a focused discussion with the teacher with less distraction. There are still some parents who strongly prefer to have a private conversation with the teacher about how their child is doing and areas of focus. Parents should always reach out directly to the teacher if they have concerns or feel a 1:1 discussion is required. Brendan will assess how the conferences are structured next year and

perhaps there is a 1:1 parent/teacher discussion and then a student led discussion. Brendan will be issuing a survey to parents to get their feedback on how next year could be structured to ensure the conferences are of value to teachers, parents & students.

FEEVES does not yet know how much was made at the casino. FEEVES will continue to fund the more expensive investments around the school over the next 2 years. There are some restrictions on what FEEVES money can be used for. Brendan will continue to work closely with FEEVES and school council on practically allocating funds where they are most needed. Focus areas would be literature which speaks more to kids nowadays, richer novel studies and French literature. There may also be the opportunity to take a year off from inline skating or have parents pay for some of these added activities.

There was some general discussion around fundraising next year and whether we look to replace Mathathon with another type of fundraiser. There were some kids who didn't know about Mathathon and it may be too close to the type of work the kids do every day. There is the opportunity to expand/change the fun lunch program to try to raise more funds for that and Michelle will be working on some ideas. If we move collections from fun lunches to School Cash Online, this will also save some money. It will take additional volunteers if we move away from Healthy Hunger as Healthy Hunger does a lot of the administration, so this will also need to be considered.

2. Vice Principal's Report

The kids are excited about the lunch clubs with many new ideas being brought forward for clubs. There is currently floor hockey, beyblades, earth rangers, art rangers, unicorns, etc. The clubs are run by students and if someone wants to start a club, there is a process they must go through to present their idea and structure. Everyone is very excited about the clubs and there are many ideas for new clubs.

3. Treasurer's Report

Laurie provided the update on the financials. Over the months of December and January, we took in a total of \$2,814.12 through our Healthy Hunger program. The HH income is trending to be below last years' total. There were no other revenues to report. As for our expenses, December included \$4,806.81 for special programs including French Culture week, Alberta Opera Fees, & friendly Helper Hats. There were also a couple grade team expenses. January special programs included Sound Kreations payment, Canadian youth speakers, reading cards, & grade teams at a total of \$6,811.67. Some money will be collected during the family dance especially if we collect donations, have a silent auction and raffle baskets. The planning for the dance will be started with a separate committee in the next couple weeks to ensure we can incorporate ideas to raise money.

Laurie would like to consider other fundraising ideas for next year especially given the trending of the actual fundraising this year. Bragg Creek school division has a private fundraising function with a silent auction and they raise a substantive amount of money doing this every year. It is reasonable to get parents to commit to some additional fundraising and this will be further explored for next year.
