October has been a busy month. The Board has reviewed it policies and priorities. We also created an advocacy statement which will form the basis of our discussions with Government.

The three tenants are:

- 1. Equitable Access to Funding
- 2. New Schools for Growing Jurisdictions
- 3. Provincial Review on Inclusion

Rocky View Schools received, 2.7 million dollars from the Alberta Government as part of the Classroom Improvement Fund. Each school had to develop a plan to use these funds. Distribution of funds were given on a per school base plus a per student allocation.

All of our schools are full, and most are at, or exceeding capacity. Space continues to be an issue for Rocky View Schools. The Board submitted its Capital Plan to the government. Number 1 priority was for the approval of the Langdon Junior/Senior High Community School. The approval of this school will mitigate the growth issues in the Chestermere, Langdon areas of the Division.

The Board plans meets with Parents of Prince of Peace School in Chestermere, November 14, to address options for students attending the school. The owner of the school has gone into receivership. The Province will not purchase this property, so the Board must find a solution for accommodating the Prince of Peace students.

In addition to the Prince of Peace consultations, the Board will be meeting with Airdrie parents to discuss boundary changes to accommodate growth with no further schools.

The Board has also applied for an additional 39 portables to be added to schools across the division to accommodate growth. However there is no guarantee that all of those needed will be provided.

The annual general meeting for the ASBA (Alberta School Boards Association) will be held November 18-20. This meeting of School Boards across the province is used to develop advocacy positions for discussions with Government.

The Board has reviewed the annual Student Achievement Results and Satisfaction Survey Results. In general, our results have improved over last year. There continues to be a need to focus on numeracy. The Board has numeracy as one of its strategic directions. Two numeracy specialists have been hired to assist schools in improving their numeracy scores.

A new bus routes has been added to Harmony and also to Westbrook to alleviate overcrowding and long bus rides.

Congratulations to Curtis Ostertag for achieving 100% in the Biology 30 provincial achievement test. In June he achieved 100% in the Physics 30 provincial exam.

• Community:

- The Engineering for Kids program is going very well. Given demand, there are 2 sessions running in parallel. There were some logistical issues initially which have been worked out and the instructors now take attendance at each session.

• Professional Learning:

- Yesterday was originally intended to be a PL day, but given Remembrance day is a stat holiday, yesterday was a day off in lieu.
- The PL day in December will be a math residency. The same instructor doing the math residency for students and staff will also offer a program for parents to understand the math being taught. The timing of this parent session will be confirmed early in 2019.
- Sam Hester (23rd Story) has been working with staff on illustrations of the mission and the vision as they are told. Lindsay will review what has been done at a future school council meeting.
- There has been a efforts on the school educational plan with a focus on culture of caring and academic rigour. A team of 5 staff including Lindsay will travel to Atlanta in December for 5 days to visit the Ron Clark Academy. The findings from the trip will be incorporated into the school educational plan and also reviewed at a future school council meeting.

• Miscellaneous

- Lindsay encourages all parents and staff to come to her if there are issues they have questions about or are uncomfortable with as it relates to their children. There has only been 1 reported incident of bullying in the last 3 years and the staff has put significant focus on proactive strategies such as friendly helpers, kindness campaigns and kindness slips. Teachers are also actively using the friendology 101 curriculum in their classrooms. There are a number of clubs available to students which provide the opportunity to connect with each other and with teachers. These clubs are held over lunch and at recess and include robotics, reading, etc. It may be helpful for parents to know about these clubs and have the opportunity to discuss with their children.
