### D. School Trustee Report

Great News!! Through the collective efforts of parents, students and Rocky View Transportation Department, the Board has achieved its goal of reducing the transportation budget by approximately one million dollars. The Board of Trustees is thankful to all of the parents who participated in our survey helping to create the least disruptive plan to achieve this savings.

The enrolment for Rockyview Schools has increased by over 900 students. The School Division desperately needs new schools and is advocating hard on behalf of our parents and students. Rockyview Schools continues to grow at approximately 5% per year. New school construction has not kept pace. The Board has worked with some of our schools to adjust boundaries to alleviate enrolment stress but this is only a temporary solution. Across the division we are in need two new schools per year. Last year were given zero. To boot, we did not receive all of the portables that were requested. A new school takes approximately three years to build. I would encourage all parents to be aware of school capacity needs in their communities so that schools are in place when the need is present. Parents need to let government know of their concerns in this matter.

Judi gave a shout-out to Jenny Hawryluk who won top pop song of the year at the Calgary Music Awards on September 21, 2018. Jenny is attending Springbank High School.

Judi had the privilege of attending the Academic Awards Assembly at Springbank High School. The event celebrated the Grade 12 graduates who were receiving special awards and those who had achieved one hundred 100% on Provincial examinations.

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This fall schools sponsored a "Run for Terry Fox". It is wonderful to see the next generation learn about and celebrate the legacy of this Canadian hero.

Judi included a Ted –Talk link that discusses Colorado's experience with Cannabis. It is an interesting discussion on the rates of school suspensions and the disproportionate impact on the number of racially minority students. Please note the speaker's political bias.

### Community

Engineering for Kids will also do some professional learning for the staff to ensure the staff has the tools they need to kids interested in robotics.

## Professional Learning

- PL Day September 24<sup>th</sup> – Focused on embracing diversity and the infusion of FNMI perspectives in the classroom. Had representative from Morley and the Education Centre walk the entire staff through the blanket exercise. Extremely powerful and has us now thinking about the new

- One item was identified as issue with a noticeable decline in results specifically around educational opportunities being accessible, individualized and a challenging. Will be looking for parent feedback on how to move forward with improvements in this area. Without any areas to provide qualitative comments, it is difficult to know exactly how parents interpreted this question and therefore, further feedback from parents and school council will be helpful. There was a general discussion around whether this feedback is because some parents are more used of traditional learning. Lindsay emphasized that parents will have different philosophies about learning and one size does not fit all children. Parents and children are fortunate in the Elbow Valley School as grade teams are able to meet weekly and there is a significant effort to ensure the children are getting the support they require. Teachers ensure there is a balance between traditional learning styles and the newer ways of teaching.
